

Exploring Sea Shanties

While he waited for his lunch down in the lighthouse on the rocks, Mr Grinling sang snatches of old sea shanties as he surveyed the coastline through his telescope...

What is a sea shanty?

On a ship like this the sailors would have lots of jobs to do...

Loading up all of the luggage...



Look at how the sailors work together to pass the heavy baggage along a line. They could be doing this for a very long time and had to concentrate because the bags would be cumbersome !

Pulling all of the sails up...



Look at how the sailors stand in a line and pull the rope at the same time, this was weary work and they would sing together to ensure that everyone pulled the rope at the same time.



Pulling up the anchor...

This was strenuous work, the sailors would all have to push in the same direction to wind the heavy anchor up.

These jobs were hard jobs. The sailors needed to work together to get the heavy work done.



And tying the sails back up after!



To help the sailors work together and so that they were all moving at the same time, they would sing sea shanties.



Creative Fruity Pirate Ship

All aboard! Create your own delicious fruity Pirate ship

Ingredients:

1 banana
1 handful of strawberries and raspberries
2 tbsp crème fraiche, yoghurt or ice cream
1 orange
1 apple
(You can change the fruit used to your taste)

Equipment:

Knife/chopping board
Tablespoon
Plate
2 cocktail sticks
Paper and pen (to make the sails and flags)

Method:

1. Peel your banana and carefully slice it in half lengthways.
2. Lay your banana halves together on a plate.
3. Fill the gap between the 2 halves with the crème fraîche.
4. Place your strawberries and raspberries on top of the crème fraiche, yoghurt or ice cream. These are your pirate crew!
5. Cut your orange and apple into slices and place these around the outside of your boat to make oars.
6. Cut out paper sails and decorate them with some skull and crossbones.
7. Carefully slide the sails onto each cocktail stick and push the sticks into the banana to make the ship's sails.
8. Enjoy your tasty fruity pirate ship!
