Why do you think that?</i></p> <p>Listen to the story being read by the author https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Ro5S_UdvWkI Are there any similarities to the Pirates Next Door?</p>	<p>Revise rounding to the nearest 10.</p> <p>Here's the general rule for rounding: If the number you are rounding is followed by 5, 6, 7, 8, or 9, round the number up. Example: 38 rounded to the nearest ten is 40. Answer the following questions. Remember to use your Jedi Handwriting and make your sentences even more exciting by including connective words such as and, so, because, when and if. Who is your favourite pirate and why? Who was Anne Bonny the girlfriend of? What did William Kidd do before he became a pirate? Who killed Black Bart? How many times did Blackbeard marry?</p>
		 <p>Treasure Adjectives Take a good look at the treasure chest. What can you see? Draw your own pirate treasure chest. Write a list of adjectives to describe the treasure in your chest i.e glittering golden nuggets, glistening red rubies, enormous emeralds.</p> <p>You could do this on paper or using JIT. Try to present your work beautifully.</p>	<p>Rounding to the nearest 10 Practise rounding to the nearest 10 using the number line. Roll a dice (if you haven't got a dice write numbers onto pieces of paper and choose those) Make a 2 digit number eg roll a 3 and a 1 and make either 13 or 31. Then find the nearest 10 using the number line to help you. Show your thinking by writing down your numbers and their nearest 10. To make it even harder you roll the dice 3 times and use HTU.</p>	<p>Pirate rounding treasure to the nearest 10. (see PDF)</p>

Cut out the pirates and their treasure chests (or you can draw them if you would like to) and then help the pirates to sort their bags of treasure into the correct treasure chest.</p> <p>Eg: Ahoy, me hearties! I have 56 pieces of silver and gold. Where is my treasure chest?</p> <p>Look at the number (use a number line to help you) Is 56 nearer to 50 or 60 on the number line? That's right 60, so this Pirate needs to put his treasure into the treasure box labelled 60.</p>	<p>Physical Create your own pirate training exercise circuit.</p> <p>You could include:</p> <p>Walk the plank balancing X Marks the spot star jumps Run away from the sea monster shuttle runs Jump up and down on the hot sand Dig for treasure</p>
